ADVENT

A season of preparation, beginning on the fourth Sunday before Christmas, in which the Church recalls its hope and expectation in the coming of Christ, past, present and future.

CHRISTMAS

AFTER EPIPHANY

A period in which the Church reflects on the manifestation of Christ to all people. The Baptism of the Lord is the first Sunday of this period. On the last Sunday, we hear the readings for the Transfiguration of the Lord. The length of this period varies depending on the date of Easter.

LENT

A season of preparation and discipline that begins with Ash Wednesday and concludes at sundown on Holy Saturday. During the forty weekdays and six Sundays in Lent, the Church remembers the life and ministry of Jesus and renews its commitment to him in Christian discipleship. The season is the traditional time to prepare for baptisms and confirmations to be celebrated at the Easter Vigil or on Easter Sunday, or during the season of Easter.

A period of time that varies in length depending on whether Easter is early or late. In this period, the Church recalls its faith in the Holy Trinity. It seeks to relate its faith as a people of God to Christ's mission in the world. It commences with Trinity Sunday and concludes with the feast of Christ the King.

The Assembly Working Group on Worship offers the Lectionary to the Church as a resource for personal and community reflection, with the prayer that as we gather for worship and for study, we will continue to grow closer to Christ who calls us to the ministry of discipleship, through the Spirit who takes our frail offerings and multiplies them into divine gifts, for the glory of God who created, sustains and renews us for eternity.

At the same time, Matthew's Gospel was written to affirm and assert the importance of community. So it is significant that Matthew's Gospel, alone of the canonical Gospels, uses the word *ekklesia* (=church) to describe the community of faith in which the followers of Jesus share fellowship. The issue then, as now, was about identifying how growth in faith is best enacted. While a personal relationship with Jesus is known to be necessary, the sharing with others of insights into the ways Jesus connects with and teaches us, heads and guides us, are also vitally important. And this sharing is now, as then, made possible when people meet together regularly – for praise and celebration, for prayer and study.

As leaders of worship and preachers we are charged with the responsibility to call people both to personal faith in the saving grace known through Jesus and into effective communities of faith which encourage and comfort the members in their growth for shared ministry in Christ.

As leaders of worship and preachers, our preparation must include as deep an engagement with the Hebrew scriptures as with the scriptures of the New Testament, to enhance our own understanding and so provide for those who share worship with us, a fuller awareness of the breadth of God's salvation-history. In this, the Lectionary's offerings of Old Testament readings are important, providing either background information to the Gospel reading or an insight into Jesus' re-orientation of ancient discernment.

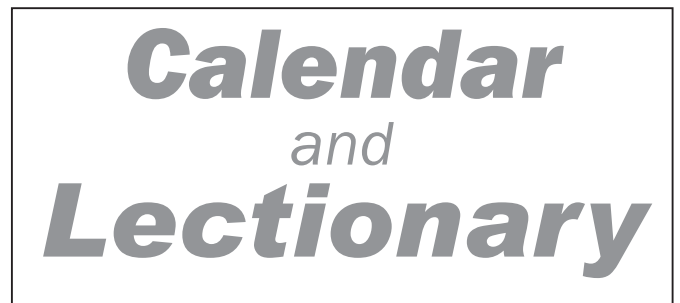
Matthew's repeated comment, "This was done to fulfil Scripture", assumed that his readers were well acquainted with the heritage of story and celebration which characterised the first century Jewish community (whether gathered in Israel or scattered across the Mediterranean world). Today's audiences, not able to make those connections, will need guidance into the heritage of Hebrew faith and worship.

As leaders of worship and preachers, it is our responsibility regularly and consistently to provide opportunities for people who gather in worship to hear and reflect on the stories of Jesus and the ways in which his ministry continues in our place and time. We are, as much as they were, the recipients of his teaching and healing, his guidance and comfort, his grace and peace.

The Gospels are the source of our awareness of the ways in which Jesus connected with people in ordinary circumstances. While it is certain that significant cultural and societal differences have grown between the first and the twenty first centuries, between the ancient Middle Eastern world and modern Australia, it cannot be argued that the needs of human life have changed very much at all. The stories of Jesus which the Gospels provide for us are important in our understanding that Jesus continues to connect with us in our daily living.

Assume that those who listen to reflections on these stories have any understanding of the full story of God's action in history. In the twenty first century, this same need applies – how best to share the gospel stories in a generation which may never from the places Jesus had lived and taught and in which Jesus had shared memories by word of mouth, but provided in a written form for communities of faith who no longer simply shared of Jesus' ministry, death and resurrection, needed to be shared in new ways – no longer simply by the sixth and seventh decades of the first century some people were realizing that the stories which had been shared of Jesus' ministry, death and resurrection, needed to be shared in new ways – no longer simply shared memories by word of mouth, but provided in a written form for communities of faith who no longer lived away from the places Jesus had lived and taught and in which Jesus had shared memories by word of mouth.

Additional notes regarding the way in which Sundays are identified and numbered in the Lectionary

Firstly, the Lectionary numbers the Sundays after Pentecost. The Sunday after Trinity will always be Pentecost 2.

The numbers in brackets for the Sundays after Epiphany and after Pentecost refer to what is known as "Ordinary Time". This is not because these Sundays are "ordinary" in the way we usually understand the term. In the Lectionary, "ordinary" comes from the word "ordinal" and refers to the order in which the numbers come...first, second, third etc. The Sundays in "Ordinary Time" include all the Sundays outside of Advent/Christmas and Lent/Easter.

It is important to understand that during Epiphany these numbers count forward from the Sunday marking the baptism of Jesus. However, after Pentecost they are counted backwards from the last Sunday of the Church Year (Christ the King/Reign of Christ Sunday). The actual numbering will vary from year to year depending on how early or late Easter falls.
